American Lady



The adult American Lady butterfly has a 1 3/4-2 5/8" wingspan. The caterpillars feed on Ironweed (Vernonia), Pearly Everlasting (Anaphalis margaritacea), Pussy Toes (Antennaria), and Sweet Everlasting (Pseudognaphalium obtusifolium).

Luna Moth



The lovely Luna moth has a 3-4 1/8" wingspan. It does not eat as an adult. The caterpillars feed on Paper Birch, Persimmon (Diospyros virginiana), Sweet Gum, Hickory, Walnut, and Sumac.

Eastern Tiger Swallowtail



The adult Eastern Tiger Swallowtail butterfly has a 3 1/4-5 1/2" wingspan. The caterpillars eat tree leaves such as Ash, Basswood, wild Cherry, Hop Tree (Ptelea trifoliata), Tulip Tree, and Willow.



How to Attract Butterflies and Moths with Native Plants

To attract the most butterflies, plant the native species that host their caterpillars. Here are a few examples to try in your own yard...



Adult Monarchs have a 3 1/2-4" wingspan. The caterpillars eat several Milkweed species. Try Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias incarnata) or Butterfly Weed (A. tuberosa) in your garden to attract them.

Pearl Crescent



Adult Pearl Crescent butterflies have a 1 1/4-1 5/8" wingspan. The caterpillars eat Asters, and many types are available. Try Heart Leaved or Big Leaf Asters in shade. New England & Smooth Asters like the sun.

Mourning Cloak



Adult Mourning Cloak butterflies have a 3-4" wingspan, and can live up to 12 months. The caterpillars feed as a group and eat the leaves of Elm, Hackberry, Paper Birch, Populus spp. and Willow.

The adult Question Mark has a 2 1/4-3" wingspan. The caterpillars eat the leaves of Elm, Hackberry, and False Nettle (Boehmeria cylindrica).

Red Spotted Purple



These beautiful butterflies have a 3-3 1/2" wingspan as adults. The caterpillars eat the leaves of trees such as Apple, Aspen, Basswood, wild Cherry, Hawthorn, Hornbeam, Oak, Serviceberry and Willow.
